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

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Jubilee Celebrations

We are incredibly excited about the plans in place to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in June. There is a weekend full of a range of activities in order to try and provide something for all parts of the community to enjoy. All of the activities will be free so that everyone has the opportunity to be part of the celebrations.

The events start on Friday 3rd June with the opening of a Jubilee themed flower display in the Church from 11am which will be available for people to visit over the course of the whole weekend. On the Friday there will also be an exhibition of Royal Memorabilia in the village hall starting from 1pm. Anybody who has any Royal Memorabilia that they would like to display can get in touch with Kate Giles who will arrange for its display. There will also be an afternoon tea in the village hall with sandwiches and cream scones for everyone to enjoy.

On the Friday evening there will be a jubilee themed quiz at the Sports and Social Club which will start slightly earlier than the normal First Friday of the month quizzes (6pm as opposed to 8pm) to ensure that as many people as possible are able to take part.

The fun of the weekend will then continue on the Saturday (4th June) with a throw-back to years gone by when an annual **fun** day was held in the sports field. There will be a host of exciting events for everyone to join in, including Welly Throwing, a tug of war competition, sack races, egg and spoon race, wheelbarrow races and a slow bicycle race. The competitions will have different age groups (including adults!) so that as many people as possible can enjoy the fun.

The bar will be open in the Sports club and, in keeping with the theme of the event, will be serving Pimms and Prosecco. From 4pm onwards until early evening there will be live music for everyone to enjoy.

The Sunday will be a great opportunity to once again bring everyone together to take part in the big jubilee party, joining millions of others around the country, to celebrate the Queen's jubilee in style. The day will start with a celebration Church service from 10.30am which will be led by the Archdeacon of York.

There will then be the big jubilee party in the sports field from 12.30pm. People are encouraged to come together to spend time with other members of the community and get to know people that you might have seen around the villages but not necessarily had the opportunity to spend time talking to. There will be lots of activities going on, including children's games and face painting. Fancy dress, on the theme of "Royal", is encouraged with prizes for the best fancy dress.

Everyone in the Slingsby, South Holme and Fryton is encouraged to decorate your houses to further celebrate the Queen's jubilee and on the Sunday there will the presentation of a prize for the best dressed house competition.

There will also be a Jubilee Cake Competition which will be judged on the Sunday. Again, the theme will be "Royal" and if you want to enter a cake just bring it along on the Sunday and it can be entered into the competition which will be judged in the afternoon and people will then get the opportunity to enjoy a slice of cake later in the day.

In addition, there will be a competition of Jubilee Art, so children are encouraged to produce a piece of art, again on the theme of "Royal" which will be judged on the Sunday with a prize for the winner.

All of the children in the village will receive a piece of commemorative memorabilia to mark the event and who knows in years to come that memorabilia could be going on display at a future royal celebration.

With so much going on over the course of the weekend we are hoping to create many happy memories for all members of the community and look forward to welcoming as many people as possible to join in the events.

Slingsby, South Holme and Fryton is a community full of many wonderful people and the Jubilee weekend provides a fantastic opportunity to bring everyone together in celebration.



We are celebrating the Queen's 70th year as Monarch with her Platinum Jubilee this June. How much do you know about her early life before she became Queen? Have a go at our quiz and find out some interesting facts.

- 1. The Queen was born on 21st April 1926 at 17 Bruton Street, Mayfair, London. What can be found at that address now?
- 2. When the Queen was born, was she first, second, third or fourth in line to the throne?
- 3. What was the Maiden name of the Queen's mother?
- 4. Where did Princess Elizabeth go to school as a child?
- 5. Which foreign language did Princess Elizabeth learn as a child?
- 6. We know that the Queen is a great animal lover, especially dogs. Her father brought home two

Pembroke Welsh corgis when Elizabeth was a child, Dookie and Jane. This was the start of her lifetime love of corgis but, how many corgis has she owned during her reign? over 15, over 20, over 25 or over 30?

- 7. When Princess Elizabeth was eleven what did she join?
- 8. Princess Elizabeth had never expected to become Queen but that all changed in 1936 when her uncle. King Edward VIII, abdicated and her father became King George VI. Making her first in line to the throne. What was King George VI's real name?
- 9. Once her father became King, Princess Elizabeth had to start preparing to one day become Queen. She received tuition in constitutional history and law from both her father and a tutor from Eton. She would also one day become head of the Church of England so she was instructed in religion by whom?

- 11. Princess Elizabeth first met her future husband, Prince Philip, at the wedding of Princess Marina of Greece to The Duke of Kent, How old was she?

- 13. The Princess was just 13 years old when War broke out. She and her sister were evacuated to Windsor Castle, 20 miles outside London to avoid the bombing raids. Throughout the War she championed aspects of wartime resilience for example tending her allotment at Windsor Castle supporting the Dig for Britain campaign. When she turned 18 in 1944 she insisted in playing a greater role. What did she do?
- 14. On 20th November 1947, Princess Elizabeth was married to Prince Philip at Westminster Abbey. What was unusual about her wedding dress?



A Coronation Story


Ellen Rosina Walls – usually called Nellie - was a big fan of the Royal family. She was born in 1899 when Queen Victoria was on the throne and lived through the coronation of 5 monarchs:

- Edward VII (1901 1910)
- George V (1910 1936)
- Edward VIII (1936)
- George VI (1936 1952)
- Elizabeth II (1952)

By 1953 Nellie's husband was dead and her 4 children were all grown up, so naturally she was keen to travel to London for the big day.

Her daughter, Kathleen Rose Walls, whilst still being a royalist, would have been happy to listen to the event on the radio. In 1953 her focus was on getting married in August, and with her father no longer around there was not much money in the family and she had other things to spend hers on that year.

However, the excitement of the occasion soon won over Kathleen and the trip was planned from York for mum and daughter and Auntie Flo. Luckily the Co-operative Society was running a trip and making all the arrangements. Kathleen and her mum had made a trip to Ireland with the Society a couple of years previously and felt confident that they would be in safe hands. The pre-travel information about the Ireland trip had included 'Please take with you Ration Books or Service Cards for all rationed commodities. If complete pages have been deposited with your local tradesman, they should be recovered'. As some rationing was still in place in 1953, a similar note will have been included.

Writing letters and postcards was an important part of people's lives in the 1950's, and just as today we would send a text or WhatsApp to family and friends, so on their Coronation trip it is likely that Nellie, Flo and Kath sent letters and cards. Here is the card showing the Changing of the Guard, sent by Auntie Flo to brother Tom and his wife Mary. The card was written on 3rd June, the day after the Coronation, and is postmarked London 4th June. Typically, much mention is made of the weather!





The Postcard says:

'June 3rd

Dear Tom and Mary, Here I am again. Hope Mary your cold is a lot better. What weather – yesterday Coronation Day was awful, tried to keep fine awhile in afternoon. Fireworks last night were Grand – were we tired – on the go from 4am till 12.30. My poor feet today I just hate to walk or put them down. Nellie and I are going to take in the races tomorrow. Hope the weather is better. We go on another bus tour Friday then leave for home (York) Sat morning. Went thru Windsor Castle and Grounds Mon. Wonderful. Tell you more of it when I see you. Will write again later. Flo'

In August 1953 Kathleen Walls married Geoffrey Miller and moved to Slingsby. Both died in 2016 and so cannot give their memories of the Coronation. Although Kathleen was a keen photographer no photos from the London trip have been found, but here are Kathleen and mother Nellie, pictured at a similar time, but at an event in York, so the fashion of the 1950's is evident. Kathleen was in her twenties and Nellie in her fifties.






Community Jubilee Spirit

In this article we will take a brief look at what life was like in the average household in 1952, the year that Princess Elizabeth became Queen. Indeed, when the Queen came to the

throne in 1952, sugar, butter, cheese, margarine, cooking fat, bacon, meat and tea were all still rationed. Rationing did not actually finish until 1954, with sugar rationing ending in 1953 and meat rationing in 1954.



Rationing and the little choice of ingredients and flavourings would make it hard for even the best of cooks to create exciting dishes. Food was seasonal (no tomatoes in winter for example); there were no supermarkets, no frozen food or freezers to store it in. It was normal for the housewife to visit separate shops for each food; the butchers, the bakers, greengrocers, or a fishmonger. The only exception was milk, delivered to homes each day. Takeaways were virtually unheard of, the only one being the fish and chip shop. Compare that with today where (from a survey by KPMG in 2021) three-quarters of Brits (76 percent) said they had ordered takeaways, doing so on average once a week!

The 1950s were the age of spam fritters (now making a comeback!), salmon sandwiches, tinned fruit with evaporated milk, fish on Fridays and ham salad for tea every Sunday. The only way to add flavour to this bland plain cooking was with tomato ketchup or brown sauce. There were no salad dressings as we know them today. Olive oil was only sold in very small bottles from the chemist, to be





warmed and placed in the ear to loosen ear wax! Salad in the summer consisted of round lettuce. cucumber and tomatoes, and the only dressing available was Heinz Salad Cream. In the winter, salad was often thinly sliced white cabbage,

onions and carrots, again served with Salad Cream. Heinz also did a range of tinned salads: Potato Salad, Vegetable Salad and Coleslaw.

1953 Queen Elizabeth Cake

When it came to recipes, you had to be resourceful with your limited range of ingredients available. **Queen Elizabeth cake** was prepared for the coronation of Elizabeth II in 1953. It is less well known than the popular dish of Coronation chicken which was invented for the big day. As food rationing still existed in Great Britain, a cake with few ingredients was in order. Queen Elizabeth cake is a dessert cake prepared with sugar, flour, dates, eggs, and butter, and topped with a sugary caramel glaze infused with shredded coconut. This cake is low in fat compared to other cakes, and has a moist consistency. It is sometimes served accompanied with tea. Here is a 'modern' recipe to try at home.

To make Queen Elizabeth Cake – see next page....

Recipe Queen Elizabeth cake (makes 12 pieces):

For the cake:

- 175g soft dates, finely chopped
- 240ml boiling water
- 1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
- 200g soft brown sugar
- 120g butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 egg
- 140g plain flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 60g walnuts, chopped

For the glaze:

- 75g soft brown sugar
- 75g double cream
- 25g butter
- pinch of salt
- 30g desiccated coconut
- 1. Preheat the oven to 175° C (300° F). Line a 23 x 31cm (9 x 12 inch) rectangular baking tray with greaseproof paper.
- 2. In a heatproof bowl, mix the dates, bicarbonate of soda and boiling water and set aside.
- In another bowl, beat the butter, sugar and vanilla until light and fluffy. Add the egg and mix well, then fold in the flour and baking powder until just combined.
- 4. Add the nuts and the date mixture (the dates should have absorbed a lot of the water, but the mixture will still be very wet it should be lukewarm, not hot). Stir with a light hand until smooth.
- 5. Pour the batter into the tray and bake for around 25-30 minutes until the top is a rich brown colour and an inserted skewer comes out clean. Leave to cool.
- 6. While the cake is baking, make the glaze put the sugar, cream, butter and salt into a saucepan, and keep stirring until the mixture comes to the boil. Remove from the heat and put aside until cold.

7. To finish the cake spread the glaze over the cake and sprinkle with the coconut. Trim the edges for a neat finish and cut into pieces.

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Anyone for Bowls?

Welburn are the Dorothy Tilley Challenge Cup and **Ryedale League Winners**

For the first time since 2003, and only the second time ever, the short mat bowlers from Welburn (York) have lifted the Dorothy Tilley Challenge cup. They defeated Thornton Dale 30 - 14 in the final at Helmsley Town Hall. 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
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Slingsby Chapel News






Royal Quiz Answers (Quiz on page 9):

- 1. A Chinese restaurant. The original building belonging to her Maternal Grandparents was bombed during the War but the address still remains the same.
- 2. **Third**. After her uncle Edward, Prince of Wales and her father, the Duke of York.
- 3. Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon.
- 4. Like many girls from wealthy families Princess Elizabeth did not go to school but was educated at home by governesses.
- 5. The Queen is fluent in French. She often has cause to use it when speaking to ambassadors or Heads of State from around the world. Prince Charles and Prince William are reportedly fluent in five languages!
- The Queens has owned over 30 corgis. She became a successful breeder of corgis; their lineage all come from the very first one she owned herself called Susan.
- 7. In order to allow the Princess to be a Girl Guide the 1st Buckingham Palace Company was formed in 1937. Her sister Margaret was a brownie. The group was made up from twenty children within the Royal household and children of Palace employees.
- 8. **Albert.** He was born Albert Frederick Arthur George. As Queen Victoria previously had unofficially banned the use of Albert as a Monarchs name out of respect for her own husband, The King took the name George. He was known to his family and close friends as Bertie.

- 14. The Queen had to collect clothing coupons for her dress because rationing was still in place after the war! Her dress was designed by Norman Hartnell. The fabric was duchesse silk satin and was embroidered with crystal beads and white seed pearls.
- 15. Between 1949 and 1951, the couple lived at Villa Guardamangia in Malta with their two children Charles and Anne. The property had been leased from Prince Philip's uncle Earl Mountbatten.

"Oliver Rayner, from Slingsby in Ryedale, is set to travel to the Netherlands where he will compete in the Youth Sailing World Championships. The 17-year-old is part of the Yorkshire Dales Sailing Club, and will join teammate Alice Davis, of Draycote Water Sailing Club in Rugby, in the mixed sailing event. They will join 16 other talented youngsters, all aged 18 or under, at the event to represent the British Youth Sailing Team.

Oliver, a sixth form student at Malton School, is now well underway with training. His typical weekend starts with a six hour drive from school to the National Sailing Academy in Weymouth. The training venue frequently changes to ensure the athletes are kept well rounded in a range of conditions. During training, Oliver spends 3-5 hours on the water then looks back and reviews his performance. He is also responsible for the cleaning and upkeep of his boat.

Stephen's Farming Column

We are facing very unpredictable and challenging times in the farming world. The climate seems to be ever more extreme and right now we are suffering because of the drought conditions. However, we are fully aware that by the time you read this it may well be raining non-stop. Of course, the biggest influence on our farm prices is the war in Ukraine.

Who could have envisaged even 3 or 4 months ago that wheat prices would be over £300 per tonne and oilseed rape is trading at over £700 per tonne. Our input prices have also gone through the roof with fertilizer, chemicals and seed prices at record levels. Pig and poultry producers are being hit particularly badly because their main cost is the cost of feed and that is based mainly on wheat and is increasing rapidly.

I have just started a new Countryside Stewardship Scheme, the 5th one I have taken part in over the last 20 years. This scheme involves sowing approximately 5 acres of wild bird seed mixes each year to feed the birds over winter, also 2 acres of pollen and nectar for the bees and other insects, and about 38 acres of a 2 year legume mix which will benefit bumble bees, butterflies and other insects and also provide food and cover for farmland birds and other small mammals. The scheme includes, beetle banks, grass margins round arable fields, and better hedge management.

Many farmers are now taking part in stewardship schemes as that is where the government is focusing its support payments as the Basic Payment Scheme is phased out. Hopefully over the coming years we will begin to see the benefits of these schemes with more birds and other wildlife in the countryside. Of course, everyone can help to promote wildlife even by planting flowers in our gardens that are good for insects and also putting up bird nesting boxes. I have a number of plantations around the farm and I would gladly put up more nest boxes in them if anyone would like to sponsor one or more. Over the years I have had great pleasure in seeing barn owls, kestrels and stock doves using nest boxes I have put up.

Allotment News

Going down to the allotment site it's obvious everyone is working hard because most plots look so good. On our plot I've started our annual battle with horsetail. This weed seems impossible to

eradicate and is worse than ever this year. If you walk along the beck side some places are completely taken over by it. The RHS agrees it is very difficult to control since its rhizomes may be 2m or more below ground and are impossible to dig out. Weedkillers often have little effect so we'll have to continue battling with it.

On a more positive note, our orchard looked fantastic when the apples and pears were in blossom. It looks like we should get a good crop of all our fruit this year. I've pruned our two sweet cherries to start their second espalier tier. I still need to support them properly and will have to go and buy some canes from Yates' pretty soon. Similarly, I need to support the two rows of cordon trees in the centre of the orchard. These include apples, pears and plums, and they'll succumb to the wind if we don't get supports up.

I've got tomatoes, peppers and cucumbers growing fast in the greenhouse at home and they are all just about in flower now. I'll plant them out in the allotment green house in the next week or so. Hopefully that will mean we will be harvesting tomatoes some time in early July.

On the rest of the site, we've got no further with our preparations for the pond we are planning in one of the beds. At the moment (middle of May) the hole we have dug is baked hard clay. It seems like I'm always unhappy with weather.


